1. What is your name?

15. Is there a native English speaker (maybe a novelist or poet) whose writing style you admire and try to imitate? Who is it?

16. Have you spent time in an English-speaking country? Which one? And which city? How long? Doing what? How long ago?

17. What is your native language? What other languages do you speak besides your native language and English, and how well do you speak them?



18. How easy is it for you to work online? (Think of download speed, data limits, etc.; there will be videoconferences, and there will be pre-recorded videos you can download or stream, plus some large-ish PDF files and audio files.)
19. Which would you prefer—purely online? hybrid (face-to-face with live streaming on the internet)? old-school face-to-face teaching on campus in Saarbrücken?
20. Which do you prefer: Microsoft Teams or Zoom? Why? Do you like Moodle? Do you organise your studies around it?
21. Should I use a private email address in addition to your uni email? If so, let me know the address. (And should I add you to the MS Teams team using this address, e.g. if LSF is misgendering you?)
22. Why did you choose this course, on this day, at this time? (the content? the teacher? your timetable? other reasons?)
23. Do you have any health or disability or other issues? (Some examples from previous semesters: allergies to old building materials; impaired vision; anxiety about tests or examinations or interacting with other people; problems arranging childcare; part-time jobs that consume most of your time.)
