



1 Dialectal differences

2 Structurally, the English language is fairly homogeneous all over the
3 world, but there are marked differences in pronunciation between its
4 many dialects. It is interesting to note that some of the most striking
5 of these differences occur in the small island of Britain, a fact for
6 which there is, of course, a perfectly logical historical explanation.
7 Visitors from the United States of America, where only three main
8 dialects are recognized, are often taken aback when they hear the
9 widely differing British accents.

10 During the Second World War, a number of British and American
11 mechanics who were stationed in a certain country in the Near East,
12 were living together in a local boarding house. One day at tea-time an
13 American who hailed from Kansas was sitting opposite a
14 Yorkshireman who had a strong local accent and two Londoners, one
15 of whom spoke in the Received Pronunciation while the other had a
16 marked Cockney accent. After listening for some time to the
17 conversation of these three, the Kansan suddenly burst in with: "Say, I
18 can't figure out how you Britishers understand one another."
